Purpose of the Plan

To define and guide how Corangamite CMA supports Landcare within the region. This plan specifies the roles, activities and processes provided by the CMA that can assist Landcare groups and networks to achieve their goals and contribute to State and National strategies. It recognises the support Landcare provides to the Corangamite CMA and outlines steps to increase mutually beneficial outcomes that will enhance land and catchment health in the region.

The Corangamite CMA acknowledges the traditional custodians of the land and waters where we work and pay our respects to the Elders past and present

How to use this Plan

This Plan is designed to outline how the Corangamite CMA supports Landcare and provide a framework for an ongoing partnership between the Corangamite CMA and Landcare in the region. The Plan guides the work of the Regional Landcare Coordinator and can be used by all stakeholders to understand the relationships and processes that guide the relationship.

Specifically, it can be used to:

- Understand the Landcare focused roles in the region and how they relate to each other.
- Communicate Landcare’s activities and impact in the region.
- Understand how the Corangamite CMA will support Landcare in their activities going forward.
- Identify the key policies and strategies that may impact on Landcare’s work.
- Understand the relationship between Landcare and the CMA, including the guiding principles, strategic focus and processes for working together.
- Guide the regular activities of the Regional Landcare Coordinator.
- Guide the annual process for developing a shared Action Plan that can respond to the emerging needs and priorities of Landcare in the region.
- Guide a monitoring and review process.

What is Landcare?

Landcare is a grassroots movement of groups, networks and individuals across Australia with a shared vision to protect, enhance or restore the natural environment in their local community through sustainable land management, agricultural practices and conservation activities.

We use the term Landcare to capture a range of not-for-profit groups that fall into this definition but may not use the term Landcare in their name, such as 'Friends of' groups.

What has Landcare been doing?

Otway Food and Fibre Showcase

Central Otway Landcare Network has hosted four Otway Food and Fibre Showcases over several years, supporting local artisan producers and aim to building resilience in the local food system. We then work back on the farm, taking a more holistic approach to sustainable local produce. Approximately four thousand people have attended these events over the years.

Helping Birds of Prey

Bellarine Landcare's Rabbit Action Group held a 'Our Wonderful Birds of Prey' event where Leigh Valley Hawk and Owl Sanctuary's awed an audience of 100 with their live Raptors demonstration. Collaboration with Deakin University led to an education flyer on rodenticides and collaboration with local Hardware stores and residents to reduce use of second-generation rodenticides.

Support for Shells and Sea Slugs

Otway Ocean Care have secured their first grant to run highly successful workshops on shells, sea slugs, seaweed and fish. They now have their own jumpers, a grant to run twice as many workshops next year and over 100 members!

Aerial Seeding and Surveying

Heytesbury District Landcare Network has completed a drone survey of an aerial seeding revegetation project of burnt-out Lake Cobrico, with an information night hosted by Elingamite Cobrico Landcare Group.

21C Slab Hut

The Ballarat Region Tree Growers' 21C Slab Hut at the Imlal Biorich Plantation was done slow, local and carbon low. The Hut drew on local select harvesting of farm forestry products and eloquently continues the story we start with our Landcare plantings – demonstrating novel pathways in localised supply chains.

Platypus Citizen Scientists

The Upper Barwon Landcare Network has raised the profile of platypus in our waterways and the importance of ensuring good habitat for them to thrive. With over 60 people involved in a citizen science project collecting eDNA from our local rivers and creeks, we have been able to determine this special creature's local distribution.

Building regenerative farming

Surf Coast and Inland Plains Network delivered a workshop 'Hungry for Knowledge' at the Minya winery with over 100 people enjoying a display of local small-scale producers and a keynote by Gourmet Farmer Matthew Evans, discussing the importance of caring for our soil. This inspired the formation of a new regenerative farmers group for the region.

Zero Waste Event Support

The new 'Zero Waste Event Kit' from Bellarine Catchment Network has now been rolled out at multiple festivals and events like the National Celtic Festival. The bright and beautiful bin hubs have helped event coordinators reduce their waste by guiding patrons to dispose of their waste correctly.

Some fantastic recent projects from across the region

Thousands of Trees

Landholders across the Corangamite Lakes Landcare Area have kept up with their annual planting of 40,000 native trees to serve as habitat patches and biodiverse windbreaks for stock.

National Koala Monitoring

Moorabool Catchment Landcare Group partnered with CSIRO and Wadawurrung Traditional Owners to fill key Koala population knowledge gaps as a part of the National Koala Monitoring Program in the Moorabool region.

Moorabool River Revegetation

The Maude and District Landcare Group has cleared boxthorn, blackberry, peppercorn, and other weeds next to the Moorabool River on Perdrisat Road. They have revegetated with indigenous plants, to encourage native wildlife and for travellers and locals to have connection and access to the Moorabool River.

Scotsburn Phoenix Project

The 4-year Scotsburn Phoenix Project delivered 95 hectares of land revegetated with 22,978 trees planted, 58 community engagement events, 230 hectares of weed control, and 23 kilometres of fencing remnant vegetation.

Strategic Connections

Various regional, state and national strategies, policies and programs guide the work of government organisations, including Corangamite CMA and DELWP. They can impact on the priority areas of focus for organisations and projects. It can be useful for Landcare members and leaders to understand these strategies and helpful for guiding grant applications and project planning.

Summary of key strategies and policies and their relevance to Landcare

The table below outlines some key strategies and policies of relevance to Landcare in the Corangamite region. It is not an exhaustive list, and other strategies may be worth consulting during project planning and grant application writing.

These strategies are informed by various pieces of state and federal legislation, including the Environment Protection and Biodiversity Conservation Act 1999 (EPBC), Aboriginal Heritage Act 2006, Catchment and Land Protection Act 1994 and the Water Act 1989.

Developing this Plan

The development of the Corangamite Landcare Support Plan is led by the Regional Landcare Coordinator as a core component of the Corangamite CMA's funding agreement with DELWP. The Plan has been developed to support Landcare in the region through communication, coordination and facilitation and contribute to the implementation of key Corangamite CMA and DELWP Strategies.



In recognition of the importance of the Partnership between the Corangamite CMA and Landcare and the knowledge and experience Landcare has, extensive consultation was undertaken when developing this plan to ensure that local needs and priorities were understood. To ensure changing needs and priorities are the focus for actions, the Annual Action Plan model has been developed.

Consultation was facilitated through regional Landcare networks and groups. Visits across the region were undertaken and collective discussions were held with Chairs and Facilitators at quarterly meetings.

Key goals for the region that were highlighted, which this Plan can support were:

- A well-connected network of information sharing
- Landcare leaders that have the training, resources and knowledge to support their groups and networks
- Landcare groups and networks feel supported by DELWP and CMA to achieve their goals and strategies
- Cross-collaboration and landscape scale projects
- Resilient groups that have the support and resources to manage funding cycles
- Visibility, recognition and growing participation within the community for Landcare
- Forwarding thinking activities that are adaptive to climate change and other emerging issues and trends

Strategic Objectives

Strategic Focus of Support

Drawn from consultation with Landcare in the region, the principles of the partnership and the Service Level Agreement with DELWP, the following areas will form the focus of the support outlined in the Action Plan.

Communication

Enabling effective and two-way communication that ensures identification of needs and expectations, responsiveness, sharing of knowledge and a respectful working relationship.

Collaboration

Enabling joint activities, projects and programs that connect to landscape-scale needs, CMA projects, and regional, state and national strategies.

Knowledge and skills

Building capacity within Landcare through the provision of training and sharing of resources, and growing an understanding in the CMA of local needs and knowledge.

Advocacy

Increasing the visibility and understanding of Landcare to drive investment and engagement through representation at multiple levels and effective storytelling.

Resilience

Building resilience in the partnership, groups and environment through the sharing of knowledge, provision of funding and support to attract new funding.

Working in Partnership

Corangamite CMA and Landcare in the region are committed to working in partnership to support healthy land and waterways in our region. For the purpose of delivering this partnership, the Landcare community is represented by the regional networks through their Chairs and Facilitators.

Principles of the Partnership

Originally developed in 2015 as part of a Statement of Partnership, the principles below are a renewed guide for an enduring and productive relationship between the Landcare community and Corangamite CMA. They recognise our mutual commitment to natural resource management and the diverse skills both groups hold. Aligning our interactions to these principles will enhance our collective capacity to optimise outcomes for the protection and restoration of natural resources in the Corangamite region.

- 1. Shared Responsibility** – The Corangamite CMA and Landcare each brings a commitment to a healthy environment, strong communities and sustainable agriculture. We work together to enhance our capacity to address the challenges we face to meet these commitments.
- 2. Respect** – Recognising and valuing the contributions and knowledge of each party, we will provide platforms for open communication and active listening.
- 3. Talking early and often** – Discussion will start early in anticipation of future opportunities allowing for the time to set priorities, design projects and negotiate roles.

- 4. Understanding context** – Recognising the wider context, each party will bring to the table their understanding of demands and opportunities in communities and in policy to enhance the relevance and effectiveness of planning.
- 5. Multilevel leadership** – Recognising that each partner can bring valuable knowledge and skills to further our collective understanding of an issue and inform the best course of action. Local and regional knowledge will be valued, and locally driven projects supported.
- 6. Building capacity** – Our people and organisations can continue to build their capacity for decisions and actions. We support each other in knowledge and skill development through shared resources and information.
- 7. Giving feedback** – Each party will provide honest feedback on what is working and not, with the goal to maintain and improve the partnership.

Governance of the Partnership

The Corangamite Landcare Network Chairs Forum provides guidance and oversight for the partnership between Corangamite CMA and Landcare. It is recognised that the CMA and Landcare Networks and groups are independent bodies with their own internal governance structures and obligations. As the Chairs Forum represents both Landcare and the Corangamite CMA, it provides an effective governance model to guide the partnership towards mutually beneficial outcomes.

The Chairperson of the Chairs forum will be the current Corangamite CMA Board Chairperson unless otherwise agreed by the Chairs Forum.

The membership of the Chairs Forum includes representatives from regional networks and groups and relevant Corangamite CMA staff. The exact composition of the group is reviewed annually to align with any organisational changes within the region.

The Regional Landcare Coordinator supports the Chairs Forum to deliver its role by taking administrative responsibility for organisation of the quarterly meetings. The RLC also organises quarterly meetings for the region's Landcare Facilitators, Coordinators and Project Officers. These meetings may be combined on agreement between both groups.

The role of the Forum is to:

- Demonstrate a tangible commitment to the CMA and Landcare partnership.
- Provides advice and recommendations to the CMA on regional opportunities and issues.
- Seeks and reviews community input on regional Landcare matters.
- Provides a voice for our Landcare Networks and the region's Landcare community.
- Operates within relevant natural resource management laws and regulations.
- Monitors Landcare issues and trends and advises the CMA Board of any changes.
- Meet quarterly to share above information and maintain the partnership, including regular review of the Principles of the Partnership.
- Provide an opportunity for network chairs and facilitators to gain and share ideas.
- Guides the process to review and develop the Annual Action Plan as outlined.
- Work together to advocate for positive outcomes for the region.



Action Plan

Standing Actions – Regional Landcare Coordinator

The Regional Landcare Coordinator is required, through agreement with DELWP to:

- Support regional Landcare and environmental volunteering
- Support the statewide delivery of the Victorian Landcare Program
- Deliver and report on outcomes that demonstrate the support provided and contribution to priority programs and themes, including the Landcare grants, Aboriginal and Traditional Owner engagement, training and communications.

From this agreement, the Regional Landcare Coordinator commits to the following ongoing actions:

- Organisation of quarterly meetings for Chairs and Facilitators
- Participation in Victorian Landcare Team
- Share training and funding opportunities, information and resources
- Facilitate the publication of regional photos and stories at a state level through the Victorian Landcare and Catchment Magazine
- Work with the Corangamite CMA Communications team to amplify Landcare activities through official CMA channels.
- Support groups to use and maintain the Victorian Landcare Gateway
- Gather local news and information from Landcare groups and networks and distribute within the Corangamite CMA. Advocate for Landcare's skills and capacities within project development and raise awareness of the Partnership Principles. Support the communication of landscape issues identified by Landcare.

Standing Actions – Regional Agriculture Landcare Facilitator (RALF)

The RALF is required through agreement with the Australian Department of Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry to support Landcare in the region with the following actions:

- Engage and inform farmers, community groups and agricultural industries within their management unit about emerging ideas, climate change activities, on-farm biosecurity and chemicals management, innovative practices and relevant new government policy to help improve the sustainability, productivity and profitability of agriculture
- Facilitate partnerships that will best deliver agriculture outcomes, such as connecting industry, grower and community groups so that they can work together to address common issues.
- Work with the Corangamite CMA Communications team to amplify Landcare activities through official CMA channels.
- Supporting the delivery of National Landcare Program Sustainable Agriculture projects.
- Participating in a 'Communities of Practice' to better understand complex issues, improve networks and help develop solutions for national priorities.
- Communicate emerging local issues at a National Level.

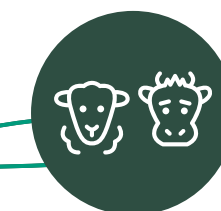
Annual Action Plan (AAP)

Annual Process

June	RLC develops an AAP survey to gather information about network priorities and needs
July	Chairs and facilitators liaise with their groups and members to gather information and respond to the survey
August	RLC collates responses and shares with all networks
August	RLC prepares action plan outline, liaise internally to identify Corangamite CMA opportunities across departments and connection to priorities
September	Chairs and Facilitators meet with Corangamite CMA to discuss and confirm shared priorities and actions
September	RLC finalises the Action Plan based on the actions agreed at the meeting and distributes to all
Oct-Sept	Delivery of actions.

When applying for the Victorian Landcare Grants or Support Grants, Landcare groups complete the Group Health Survey to report on their group's membership and activities

This is used to inform the development of the Regional Landcare Report Card.

Annual Review

Landcare Review of Annual Action Plan

From 2023, the Landcare groups and networks will report against specific actions that have been committed to under the Annual Action Plan, as part of the Survey.

A review of progress to date will be held at the last meeting of the financial year (usually in June). Some actions may roll into the start of the next year as the new plan is being developed.

RLC Review and Summary of Annual Action Plan

From 2023, the RLC will review the actions agreed for the Corangamite CMA in the Annual Action Plan. They will draw together a Summary Review document outlining progress against the actions, including feedback from the review meeting, and the actions by the Landcare groups and networks reported in the survey and the Corangamite CMA's actions.

This Summary Review document will be tabled at the September quarterly meeting.





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
